**Bath Tub Cleanliness**

Whether the bath tub be made of porcelain, enamel, iron or zinc, it should be kept bright and smooth. **Slept in Wagon, Both Feet Frozen, May Be Amputated.**

The ruins of the R. J. DeCollaines Co. shed are being removed and the castings that were injured by the fire have been taken away for repairs. The extreme heat cracked much of the iron and some new parts will have to be purchased. The Jellyman & Jones granite firm resumed business yesterday in the shed of Sweeney brothers.

E. K. Austin was brought to Heaton hospital from Middlesex yesterday, where he had frozen his feet while lying in a wagon in the rear of the Universalist church. He is in a serious condition and it is expected both limbs will have to be amputated several inches above the ankles. According to Austin's story, he had been chopping in Lyndonville and started to walk to his home in Swanton. When he reached Middlesex it was nightfall and he sought lodging for the night. In this he did not succeed, and when he saw the wagon back of the church he climbed in and went to sleep. When he awoke his feet were frozen and he was unable to move them. Until late Sunday afternoon he remained there, unable to attract anyone by his calls. Then Eugene Stufflebean, who lives in the nearest house, heard moans and investigated. It will be a day or two before it is determined whether amputation will have to be resorted to.

The officers elected at the town meeting yesterday were as follows: Moderator, W. E. Granger; clerk, G. E. McAllister; school director for three years, H. M. Jeffords; lister for three years, J. F. Bailey; selectman for three years, E. J. Clogston; road commissioner, H. N. Farnham; overseer of the poor, G. W. Savery; trustee of public money, G. F. McAllister; treasurer, G. F. McAllister; auditors, J. E. Martin, C. A. Briggs, J. G. Pirie; town grand jurors, O. W. Dickinson, W. E. Randall; county grand jurors, W. E. Granger, J. F. Bailey, R. M. Jeffords; petit jurors, A. H. Norris, Henry Waldo, Horace Hebard, J. K. Stone, Oscar Smith; constables, George Marr, James Little; agent for prosecuting and defending suits, G. T. Colby.

The town voted to appropriate \$1 on the grand list to defray town expenses, 25 cents for highways and bridges and 75 cents for support of schools. It was voted unanimously to accept the offer of Mrs. Laura L. Ainsworth to give a library building and a trust fund toward its maintenance; also to accept the offer of a gift of the books of the Williamstown school library and the Village Improvement society library. The following were elected as trustees of the library: G. W. Lynde, W. E. Granger, Rev. D. H. Strong, Dr. E. B. Watson, Henry Poole. The town voted to appropriate \$100 for the library this year. It was also voted to place a number of electric lights, not exceeding twenty-five, in the quarry district. The vote on license was yes 56, no 90.

Ainsworth Public Library

In Town Reports 1903-1919 Volume; the Warning for March Meeting of 1911:

Article 10 – Shall the Town accept the offer and gift of Laura Ainsworth of a house for a Library and \$2,000.00, the interest thereof toward it's maintenance. Also an offer and gift of the Libraries of the Williamstown Social Library and the Village Improvement Society. Permanent ownership to be contingent upon proper care and maintenance being given said libraries.

Article 11 – To see if the Town will elect a board of 5 Library Trustees, and instruct them to make application to the State Board of Library Commissioners for State Aid.

Article 12 – To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate this year for the maintenance of a Library.

In Town Records, Volume 7, page 226; Minutes of 1911 March Meeting:

The Library Treasurer received the \$100.00 and paid all the bills.

# WARNING

The inhabitants of the Town of Williamstown, who are legal voters in Town Meeting, are hereby notified and warned to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, March 7, A. D. 1911, at ten o'clock, A. M., to act upon the following articles, viz.:

- Article 1 To choose a Moderator and a Town Clerk.
- 2 Shall license be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this town?
- 3 To hear and act upon reports of town officers.
- 4 To see whether the town will elect a Road Commissioner, or authorize the Selectmen to appoint one. (This article of warning is required according to House Bill No. 536 of this last General Assembly amending Sec. 3426 of the Public Statutes.)
- Article 5 To choose all necessary town officers.
- 6 To raise money to defray town charges.
- 7 To see if the town will vote to raise money, in addition to what the law provides, to repair highways and bridges.
- Article 8 To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money, in addition to the amount now required by law, to take advantage of Sec. 4009 of the Public Statutes as amended by House Bill 141 of the last General Assembly, and if so, how much.
- Article 9 To see if the town will vote to raise money in addition to what the Selectmen may appropriate in the said town, for the support of schools.
- Article 10 To see if the town will vote to accept the offer and gift of Mrs. Laura L. Ainsworth, donating a Library building and a book fund toward its maintenance. Also to accept the offer and gift of the Librarians of the Williamstown Social Library, and the Village Improvement Society; permanent ownership by the town to be contingent upon proper care and maintenance being given said libraries.
- Article 11 To see if the town will elect a board of five Library Trustees, and instruct such Board to make application to the State Board of Library Commissioners for state aid.
- Article 12 To see what sum of money the town will appropriate this year toward the maintenance of a Library.
- Article 13 To see if the town will vote to exempt the Granite plant of Passerly Bros. from taxation for a term not to exceed eight years.
- Article 14 To see if the town will vote to have two more electric lights on Main St., two on Highland Ave., five on highway from Alfred Currier's residence to Barre road, and 12 on Highway from Bert Bruce's shop up around past Frank Jeffords' and Mr. Dickinson's, down to connect with others near J. F. Bailey's. In all twenty-one additional lights.
- Article 15 To see if the town will vote to make an appropriation for Memorial Day.
- Article 16 To see if the town will vote to have all taxes paid to the Town Treasurer.
- Article 17 To transact any other proper or necessary business.
